## SOCIAL SLIDE NIGHT

Great turn up, and thanks to an excellent presentation by Andrew Linton. Maps, weather charts and how to assemble and pack a Keppler folding kayak, were a few of the things covered. Thanks, Andrew, much appreciated by all who turned up.

TRIP REPORT - ALKIMOS WRECK Sunday 27th April. David Kluken, John Satherley, Neil Husband, Peter Cappendell and Neville Holden, arrived at Quinns. Keith Harding came to see us off. The weather was overcast, cold and windy. Out through the surf, Nev got swamped, bailing did not help, so back to the beach, and after some good advice from the experienced blokes, and help with his spray deck, he got out. The wind was about 15 gusting 25 kits, the waves big and tricky. Two thirds along, a coffee stop, and thanks to Neville, who was a bit tired, he fell out of his boat, just to give the rest of us some rescue practice. He was close to shore and swam his boat in. Everyone got wet either in their landing or helping others. Neville decided to wait here for the others to go on to the wreck and pick him up on the way back. Around the wreck, conditions were rough, difficult and unpleasant. The swell was particularly big and the wind made for a slow paddle back. Paddling in concrete was one description. All arrived back to where Nev was waiting to yet another beach landing. Another wet one. Hot coffee and a short rest, then back out in the surf for the final leg. John made the last beach landing look easy. It was great to see the way the group all got on together and how they helped each other along the way. Everyone said they enjoyed a exciting, adventurous and tiring day. Finished at 1pm.

TRIP REPORT - Mindarie to Guilderton (Moore River) 26 & 27 April, 1997. Les Allen, John DiNucci, Tel Williams & Lawrence Cred. Distance approx. 45km. Paddle Time 7-8 hrs. Depart Mindarie 10.30am with Les, Tell and John. Lawrence had to work and was to join us next day. Used Les's trailer and Wendy helped get everything to the start, and picked us up at the end. The day was mild and cloudy with a light N.West-westerly wind and small waves. Paddled north along the coast with loaded boats towards the Alkimos, met several fishing and diving boats as well as a group in M415's on their return leg of their Alkimos trip. After checking the wreck, landed for lunch on the beach at about 1pm. After lunch continued up the coast towards Yanchep and arrived about 2pm. The swell was small and we were able to paddle over the reef into the lagoon where we landed for a break. This was the limit for the mobile phone service and it took a while to contact Lawrence to arrange the next days meeting place.

Set off at about 2.30pm and paddled a couple of kms past Two Rocks, before spotting a suitable camping area, far enough away from the other beach campers and 4wds. Landed at 4.15 and set up camp over the first dune. Good night except sand got into everything and ordinary tent pegs not very effective in sand, when the breeze picked up. After a windy but warm night with occasional showers, we woke up to a day like the previous, except much stronger wind from W-SW at 15-20kts (eased a little later) and bigger swell (about 1.5m). At 8am after breakfast, we repacked and started our wait for Lawrence. We spotted him a little further out and going a lot faster than we expected. We all set off at about 8.15am and headed NW up the coast parallel to the wind and waves. Conditions more difficult than previous day with much higher wind and waves. We paddled out further to avoid breakers. Landed on beach for a break at about 9am. Getting in and out again through the shore break took some effort and a couple of quick swims were in order for the day. After another short break, we arrived at the sandbar at the mouth of the Moore River at about 11.30am. Landing on the sand bar was not a very successful or enjoyable, the others being wiser managed better landings just to the north. After landing we carried boats to the river and ended the trip a little after 12 at the launching ramp.

GARDEN ISLAND SEA TRIP Sunday 11th Mothers Day.
Only 4 turned up, hope the rest visited mother! Set off from the beach near the causeway. It was easy paddling across to the back of Garden Is. A pleasant paddle. The sky was overcast, rain threatening, but nothing eventuated. Very sheltered behind the island, still there was a good swell. We landed on the beach and enjoyed coffee, cake and bikkies. Hard slog coming back into the wind. Back on beach about 12.30 to find late arrivals, Ewen and Dave ready to set off for a similar paddle. After comparing kayaks we went and enjoyed a massive hamburger, chips and cappuccino on the promenade at Rockingham.
